

## California Ballot Propositions 2024 MCDC Recommendations

#### Prop 2 Bonds for Public Schools and Community College Facilities.

- Authorizes \$10 billion in general obligation bonds for repair, upgrade, and construction of facilities at K-12 public schools (including charter schools), community colleges and career technical programs including for improvement of health and safety conditions and classroom upgrades.
- Support: CA Teachers Assoc; CA School Nurses Organization; Community College League of CA; League of Women Voters of CA.
- Opposed: Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Assoc.

## MCDC: Yes

#### Prop 3 Constitutional Right to Marriage.

- Amends CA Constitution to fundamental right to marry, regardless of sex or race. Removes language in CA Constitution stating that marriage is only between a man and woman.
- Support: Sierra Pacific Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America; Dolores Huerta Foundation; Equality CA; Planned Parenthood Affiliates of CA; Human Rights Campaign; TransLatin@Coalition; League of Women Voters of CA.
- Opposed: CA Family Council; The American Council of Evangelicals.

## Prop 4 Bonds for Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Protection, and Protecting Communities and Natural Lands from Climate Risks.

- Authorizes \$10 billion in general obligation bonds for water, wildfire, and protection of communities and lands
- Support: Clean Water Action; CALFIRE Firefighters; National Wildfire Federation; The Nature Conservatory; Community Water Center; Coalition for Clean Air; League of Women Voters of CA.
- Oppose: Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Assoc.

# Prop 5 Allows Bonds for Affordable Housing and Public Infrastructure with 55% Voter Approval.

- Allows approval of local infrastructure and housing bonds for low-and middle-income Californians with 55% vote. If bonds were ultimately approved by localities would result in higher property taxes. Would change the CA Constitution for approving certain bonds by lowering the voting requirement for approval from 2/3 to 55%.
- Support CA Professional Firefighters; League of Women Voters of CA; Habitat for Humanity CA.

• Oppose – CA Taxpayers Assoc; CA Hispanic Chambers of Commerce; Women Veterans Alliance.

# Prop 6 Eliminates Constitutional Provision Allowing Involuntary Servitude for Incarcerated Persons.

- Amends CA Constitution to remove current provision that allows jails and prisons to impose involuntary servitude to punish crime (i.e. forcing incarcerated persons to work).
- Support: Assemblymember Lori Wilson; Dolores Huerta Foundation; Law Enforcement Action Partnership; League of Women Voters CA.
- Oppose: None submitted

## Prop 32 Raises Minimum Wage

- For employers with 26 or more employees raises minimum wage to \$17 immediately, \$18 on Jan. 1, 2025
- For employers with 25 or fewer employees raises minimum wage to \$17 on Jan. 1, 2025, \$18 on Jan.1, 2026.
- Support: none; put on ballot be petition signatures; League of Women Voters; UNITE HERE Local 11; One Fair Wage

• Oppose: CA Chamber of Commerce; CA Restaurant Assoc.; CA Grocers Assoc.

## Prop 33 Rent Control

- Repeals Costa- Hawkins Rental Housing Act of 1995 which currently prohibits local ordinances limiting residential rental rates for new tenants or rent increases for existing tenants in residential properties that were 1<sup>st</sup> occupied after Feb.1, 1995; single family homes; and condominiums.
- Support: CA Nurses Assoc; CA Alliance for Retired Americans; Mental Health Advocacy; Coalition for Economic Survival; Tenants Together; AIDs Healthcare Foundation.
- Oppose: CA Council for Affordable Housing; Women Veterans Alliance; CA Chamber of Commerce; CA Small Business Assoc; CA Hispanic Chamber of Commerce; CA Senior Alliance.
- League of Women Voters is neutral.
- The biggest question about Prop 33 is what impact will it have on building affordable housing.

## Prop 34 Restricts Spending of Prescription Drug Revenues by Certain Health Care Providers

• Requires certain providers to spend 98% of revenues from federal discount prescription drug program on direct patient care. Authorizes statewide negotiation of Medi-Cal drug prices.

- Support: The ALS Assoc; CA Chronic Care Coalition; Latino Heritage LA;
- Oppose: National Org for Women; Consumer Watchdog Coalition for Economic Survival; AIDS Healthcare Foundation; Dolores Huerta.
- Has been dubbed the Stop the Revenge Initiative to stop passage of Prop 33 on Rent Control.

## MCDC: No

### Prop 35 Provided Permanent Funding for Medi-Cal Health Care Services

- Makes permanent the existing tax on managed health care insurance plans which, if approved by the federal government, provides revenues to pay for Medi-Cal health care.
- Support: Planned Parenthood Affiliates of CA; College of Obstetricians & Gynecologists; American Academy of Pediatrics CA.
- Oppose: None submitted but League of Women Voters oppose based on belief that the measure is "ballot-box budgeting." The League is concerned that the prop will limit the ability of the state to respond to changes in Medi-Cal that may occur especially changes mandated by the Feds.

## Prop 36 Allows Felony Charges and Increases Sentences for Certain Drug and Theft Crimes

- Changes Prop 47 by allowing felony charges for possessing certain drugs (especially Fentanyl) and for thefts under \$950 if defendant has 2 prior drug or theft convictions.
- Support: Crime Victims United of CA; CA District Attorneys Assoc., Family Business Assoc of CA; Californians for Safer Communities; CA Black Chamber of Commerce.
- Oppose: DA of Contra Costa County; Crime Survivors for Safety and Justice; Prosecutors Alliance Action; League of Women Voters.
- Response to "unintended consequences" of 2014 Prop 47 which changes some theft and drug crimes from felonies to misdemeanors. Would increase some sentences; those convicted could wind up serving time in state prisons rather than county jails. Creates new court process for some drug convictions (possession of specified drugs; have 2 or more past drug convictions). Eligible defendants could get treatment & if finish their charges would be dismissed.
- Opponents point to multiple new CA laws intended to deal with retail theft and drug possession.
