1.1 - Why are you running for this office? Give no more than your top 3 reasons. *

I'm running for Antioch City Council to improve public safety, create a small business development center, expand our economic development opportunities, and reduce homelessness.

1.2 - What are the responsibilities that come with the office you are running for? *

A city councilman is responsible for representing the interests of their constituents by creating and voting on local laws, policies, and budgets that affect the community. They also oversee city services and infrastructure, work with other government officials, and address residents' concerns to ensure effective and efficient municipal operations.

1.3 - What are your personal or professional qualifications that you believe make you the best candidate?

I believe my collective political experience in the last 14 years makes me the best candidate for Antioch City Council. I have broad experience in Democratic Party politics in Los Angeles and Contra Costa Counties. My experience writing legislation in the state legislature as a Legislative Aide to Assemblymember Chris Holden prepared me to learn how to form coalitions around policy, ensure the effected groups are involved in the conversation, and how I can create space for both sides of a policy issue can be heard. My policy success in the legislature led to me getting dual enrollment introduced to California high school students. Dual enrollment allows high school students to attend a Community College and High School at the same time. This allows pathways to be created for high school students to start a career path right out of high school. According to the Public Policy Institute of California, over 100,000 California students now are enrolled in dual enrollment programs. I have also campaigned for many Democratic Party candidates in California and Nevada such as President Obama, Ken Carlson for Contra Costa County Supervisor, Former Assemblymember Steve Fox, and many more. I am currently the East County Director for the Contra Costa County Young Democrats and last year I was the External Vice-President. This year I was successful as one of the negotiating parties for Proposition 4, our climate bond. The climate bond has many climate resilience programs that need desperate funding such as wildfires, floods, drought, and sustainable agriculture. I have many more policy successes that show that I am able to work with community groups and establish good policy.

1.4 - What are your top goals for this office? How do you plan on achieving them? *

My top goals for Antioch City Council are to improve public safety, reduce homelessness, expand economic development, and assist small businesses.

Public Safety: Enhance community policing to build trust, seek grants for de-escalation training, and address traffic safety with stop signs and speed bumps.

Homelessness: Increase support services, provide resources for our CORE team, build more transitional housing, and support churches building housing on their properties.

Economic Development: Create business incentives, focus on sustainable industries, and improve infrastructure, including our Amtrak Station.

Small Business Assistance: Organize workshops, training, and establish partnerships to support small businesses.

These goals will create a safer, more prosperous environment for all Antioch residents.

1.5 - How do you plan on engaging your constituents in dialogue after you are elected? *

I plan on continuing to regularly join community meetings like Marsh Creek Democratic Club. I also plan on hosting regular office hours and having an open door policy.

2.5 - If elected, what would you do to advance equity, anti-racism, justice, and belonging? *
In Antioch, our biggest challenge with racism, equity, and justice has been our police department. I will work to terminate officers involved in the Antioch Police texting scandal for their racist actions and failure to intervene as required by law. Officers admitted to illegal acts and using racist viewpoints in law enforcement, including allowing a K-9 to bite a handcuffed suspect and expressing enjoyment over deaths in custody. This is unacceptable and violates community trust. I support involving the Citizens Advisory Police Commission in hiring new officers to ensure they can work with minorities. Additionally, I will seek funds to build more transitional and permanent housing for low-income residents to address homelessness.

I completely align to the DPCCC value of criminal justice and conflict resolution. I believe in having a safe and welcoming community. I was raised in Los Angeles where many of my friends were immigrants from various places in Latin America. It wasn't until I was a teenager I recognized the importance of keeping my friend's immigration status secret. We made sure to never involve them in any trouble since any interaction with the police at the time would have triggered an immigration investigation since at the time sanctuary laws did not yet exist in California. We would also make sure that if the police were around we hid our friends since it wasn't unusual for Los Angeles Police to stop people at random for identification investigations. I believe profiling of any group because of their race, culture, religion, nationality, gender, or sex is unacceptable. I believe in getting to learn other cultures. My wife and I have traveled to Europe, Asia, and Australia exploring other cultures and religions. Every culture in the world has beauty in it if you come with an open heart and an open mind. As a former police recruit for the City of San Jose I strongly encourage more law enforcement training. In fact if I am elected to the Antioch City Council I will be looking for de-escalation trainings for our police department. As someone that has taken a California Peace Officers Standards Test (POST) course on de-escalation for law enforcement I don't think it goes far enough to educate our officers on verbal de-escalation techniques. California POST heavily relies on an individuals ability to verbally de-escalate situations based on their life experience. Some police officers do not come from culturally diverse backgrounds and because of their young age may not have enough life experience to properly de-escalate a situation. While I can't enact these policies on city council I would like to extend all California Police Academies to a minimum of one year of training before they go out on the street. The extended time will include verbal and physical de-escalation techniques as well as building in cultural understanding as a part of training. It would have been my hope that some of these training suggestions would have prevented many of the negative interactions impacting Antioch residents from our police department. My hope is to work with Antioch's mayor and other members of the city council to review the training our recruits are receiving at the various police academies Antioch puts its police recruits through. Although I am not running for a federal office my general stance regarding U.S. Foreign Service is to ensure it is fully funded. We need more diplomats than warriors. I believe in finding a diplomatic solution whenever possible before resorting to military options.

DPCCC Value: Education & Child Support Services

Advocates for high-quality, affordable child care; support programs for low income families including
access to parks and job retraining; ensures educational materials (textbooks, library books) are
inclusive, historically accurate, and reflect scientific consensus including age-appropriate, medically
accurate sex/gender education; replacing sworn peace officers in schools with trained non-police
personnel; Supports policies that respect students' civil rights related to gender expression and
addresses issues like gender-based violence and harassment.

My mother has been a dedicated childcare provider in Victorville, CA for over 24 years, offering essential services to families in need. Alongside fellow providers, she joined SEIU 99 Child Care Providers United to address critical issues that the state of California had overlooked. One of the major concerns was the low pay for childcare providers, many of whom were earning minimum wage despite the vital role they play in supporting families unable to afford childcare. Prior to 2022-2023, numerous providers had gone years without a raise, leading to financial hardships and closures, especially during the challenging times of the pandemic.

I proudly stood with SEIU 99 in Sacramento as they marched to raise awareness and advocate for better conditions for childcare providers. As a result of their efforts, significant progress was made, including increased funding for retirement benefits, healthcare, training, and additional childcare slots for families in need. This demonstrates the power of collective action and advocacy in bringing about positive change for essential workers in our communities.

Education has been transformative in my own life, lifting me out of poverty and shaping my perspective on the importance of creating safe and inclusive environments for all students. While I recognize the complexities surrounding the presence of police officers in schools, I believe in finding a balance by implementing plainclothes officers for security and prioritizing alternative behavioral support programs over punitive measures like incarceration for adolescents.

DPCCC Value: Seniors & Veteran Support Services

- Supports the California Master Plan for Aging including dignified living at home housing options that are age, disability, and dementia-friendly; prioritize public housing initiatives over privatization for seniors and adults with disabilities; support retraining for those aged 55-65, and extend unemployment; oppose mandatory retirement; call for stronger oversight of reverse mortgage programs, rigorous prosecution of financial crimes against seniors; support comprehensive single-payer healthcare, with interim Medicare Part D reforms; support HICAP services, affordable mental healthcare including issues around isolation, quality caregiving, and increased funding for In-Home Supportive Services. Preserve programs like Adult Protective Services and home-delivered meals; advocate for the removal of the FICA income limit to strengthen Social Security and preserve pensions.
- Champions the needs of veterans and military families by promoting equitable treatment and benefits, access to education including tuition waivers and retraining, adequate healthcare funding including government assistance for those exposed to toxins; elimination of veteran homelessness, establishment of Veterans' Courts and justice programs and support independent investigations of claims of hazing, rape, sexual assault and harassment and that the military remove the chain of command from all investigations and prosecutions; support a path to citizenship for military service members, and protections against discrimination based on ethnicity, disability, gender identity, political affiliation, race, religion, or sexual orientation; oppose deportation of military personnel and limitations on citizenship for children of veterans who are born abroad.

Antioch lacks senior living facilities in my district, highlighting the need for expanded housing options. Despite the plan's merits, there's a lack of state funding and data to determine necessary services and locations. Addressing gaps in long-term care and home health services statewide is crucial. Supporting seniors in choosing retirement or retraining is vital, alongside a social security overhaul. Ensuring adequate medical and housing facilities for seniors, many of whom rely on family care due to facility limitations, is essential. Prioritizing veteran support is critical, as seen in instances where veterans resort to desperate measures for benefits. Expanding facilities for both seniors and veterans is crucial to honoring their service and providing timely care.

DPCCC Value: Affordable Housing & Environmental Protections

Supports eviction protections, rent control/stabilization, anti-harassment ordinances, and habitability
protections; Supports zoning and housing policies that ensure sustainability and affordability,
including infill and mixed-use developments that balance job opportunities with housing availability;
Promotes the integration of green spaces and community gardens in all communities; Supports local
authority in phasing out fossil fuel extraction and preventing the zoning of new extraction sites;
Advocates for strong regulatory measures for setting science-based health and safety setbacks from
residential areas for industrial sites, including oil and gas wells and toxic dump sites.

I advocate for local rent control, anti-harassment ordinances, and protections for renters in California's challenging housing market. Earlier this year I urged the Antioch City Council to pass a Just Cause Eviction ordinance, I aim to safeguard renters from predatory practices. Predictable rents, market stability, and less discrimination foster community stability. Upzoning in Downtown Antioch can spur affordable housing and economic growth. Investing in community gardens, green spaces, and reopening amenities like Contra Loma Park's pool benefits residents. Addressing dry brush fire risks requires strategic measures, like promoting public land grazing for soil improvement and fire prevention. As a council member, I prioritize housing affordability, community well-being, and environmental sustainability.

DPCCC Value: Equality & Human Rights

Actively advocates for a just and inclusive society, speaking out against all forms of racism,
discrimination, harassment, hatred, and violence; Supports movements and initiatives that address
discrimination; Enforces policies that ensure equal opportunities and equal pay for equal work across
genders, races, and abilities; Upholds the rights of transgender and gender non-conforming individuals
for acknowledgment of their stated name, gender, and pronoun; Supports the use of gender-neutral
language to foster an inclusive environment; Promotes the participation of women, LGBTQIA+, people

I began volunteering with the Democratic Party during Occupy Wall Street, advocating for lifting people out of poverty and expanding the middle class. As a student in California, I helped pass the Middle Class Scholarship Act, reducing fees by 40% at state universities. I support equal pay, gender-neutral language, and diverse representation in elected offices. I value free speech as a cornerstone of democracy, especially in a world where it is under threat. Building common ground around essential issues like education, childcare, and sustainable transportation is crucial to me. If elected to the Antioch City Council, I will focus on these priorities.

DPCCC Value: Healthcare & Reproductive Rights

Advocates for the preservation of rights under Roe v. Wade, guaranteeing confidential and unrestricted
access to reproductive services without the need for consent or judicial intervention, ensuring
continued coverage of all healthcare options; Works toward implementing a universal, single-payer
healthcare system, while in the interim, seeking reforms to make Medicare Part D more affordable and
accessible, including the ability for Medicare to negotiate drug prices.

As a cis gender male it is my belief that men shouldn't have a say in women's healthcare decisions unless welcomed into the decision. Women should not live in fear for making healthcare decisions that protect their life. I strongly believe that roe vs. wade should be preserved. Women should be able to talk to their doctor and know the conversation is confidential and will not lead to legal intervention. I will always promote a single payer healthcare system. I strongly believe America is in dire need of a universal healthcare system. This system can also force cost controls on medicine and medical equipment, which are overly priced. If elected to the Antioch Clty Council I plan on being an ally and a voice on women's rights issues.

Support for Small Businesses and Entrepreneurship focusing on women, people of color, and those
with limited entrepreneurship opportunities including veterans; Support the rights of employees to

local grocery stores and community gardens in underrepresented areas.



As a former government relations advocate at CAMEO, I supported the first small business stimulus package in California, including COVID-19 grants and assistance for farmers. I worked on legislation like SB 666 to regulate small business financing fees and SB 33 to disclose Merchant Cash Advance APRs. Regulation in small business lending is crucial, especially for owners unaware of high interest rates. CAMEO led efforts to regulate commercial lending in California, addressing challenges faced by small businesses, particularly those owned by people of color. Access to capital is limited for small businesses, often resorting to predatory lenders. Federally funded Small Business Development Centers provide crucial support.
